The Green Lake Association's mission is to preserve and protect Green Lake and its surroundings. To enhance the water quality, fishery, boating safety, and aesthetic values of the recreational lake for today and future generations to enjoy.

Aquatic Invasive Species (AIS) Report

It has been a long spring, and everyone is itching to get on the water, but the weather gave us a tease and seems to still want to hold on to the "unpleasant" boating weather. With the spring treatments coming up, I wanted to give everyone a quick overview of what the treatments are all about. Over the last couple years, I have a lot of the same questions that I get asked frequently. I wanted to touch base on these questions, on and off, as the year passes. Feel free to hit me up anytime to discuss further in depth or if you have any ideas on what needs to be clarified by the GLA.

Today's email question:

Where does the board determine to treat for weeds and why?

- A. One of the hottest questions on the lake, right?? The board members will check the lake yearly for the areas that are most viable to treat, meaning the areas that will benefit the entire lake the most by removing this area of Aquatic Invasive Species (AIS) growth. There will always be other areas, but we must treat the growing and fast spreading areas first and foremost. There are also areas that we need to be very careful on as removing invasive species may bring native species into the area and thus, we will no longer be able to treat those areas. It is quite a balance as you can see.
- **B**. After the determination is completed, sometimes the GLA is subject to secondary company inspection. This year will be one of those. An independent vendor compliance company that is approved by the DNR, will come out and completely verify that the GLA has made the right choices. They will then create the reports and approve the treatment areas along with the DNR so we can move forward with treatments.
- **C**. The invasive species we treat on the lake are CLP, (curly leaf pondweed), Milfoil, and Purple Loosestrife. You must treat at the correct time to ensure the largest capture and best use of the chemical. The treatments take one day each. CLP will typically be in May. This will stop the growth of CLP before it can produce turions (what can reproduce the CLP). This typically ensures a smaller CLP in that area for the next year. Milfoil is done in late June or early July depending on the lake temperatures and conditions.
- D. The GLA treatments can't be performed within 150ft of any dock.
- E. The maximum acreage that the GLA is required to treat is only 184.2 acres.
- **F**. The chemicals we use are approved by the DNR and are selective, meaning they generally only work on certain plants. These chemicals will not harm most native plants. Our Curly Leaf treatment is done early in spring before sub sur face temperatures are just below 60 degrees, so there is little to no impact on native plants.
- **G**. We encourage any member to bring up any areas that they feel should be treated, or take a day and join us on the survey days.

Additional information. The maximum amount of treatment area is 15% of the "Littoral Area" of the lake which is 1228 x .15 = 184.2 acres only.

(Littoral Area is: Within a lake or pond, aquatic plants grow in an area known as the littoral zone--the shallow transtion zone between dry land and the open water area of the lake. In Minnesota waters, the littoral zone extends from the shore to a depth of about 15 feet, depending on water clarity).

2023 Green Lake Real Estate Report

- There were 15 home sales on Green Lake, in 2022 that were reported to the MLS. Seven of the homes sold were new construction and six of those were in the Green Lake Villas development on Little Green Lake. There was one Ridge Point waterfront townhome sale.
- The average sale price rose 19%, to \$747,945, compared to 2021. The prices ranged from \$365,000 on Johnson Lane to \$1,226,800 on Jason Ave (new construction).
- The average sale price received was 99% of the asking price, and the average marketing time was 60 days on the market.
- The average sale price of the pre-owned homes was \$586,300 and it took an average of 14 days to sell. The highest priced pre-owned home sale was \$735,000 on John Trail.
- The average sale price of the new construction homes was \$932,454 and the average marketing time was 113 days.
- The Ridge Point townhome sold for \$550,000 in 17 days.
- Inventory is extremely low and there are many buyers waiting for Green Lake homes, including townhomes, and deeded access.

Treasurer's Report 2022-23 by Treasurer Troy Ashton

Hello, I am the newest member of the Green Lake Association and as the Treasurer, I thought I would put together some information as it relates to our Lake Association and where our funds come from and what we do with those funds. The LID (Lake Improvement District) compromises a large portion of our revenue. The Chisago County LID was established in 1976 and reactivated in 1984. It was established because of high water conditions. They installed a series of channels and weirs to help drain excess water during times of high water. It has evolved into an agency whose mission is to protect and restore the surface water resources of the Chisago Lakes Chain of Lakes Watershed both environmentally and recreationally. First some statistics. Here is a breakdown of our typical revenue.

- 1. LID (Lake Improvement District) 43%
- 2. Membership dues 37%
- 3. Business sponsorships 12%
- 4. Recycling 7%

As I was going through the historical donations from individuals and businesses, I felt very grateful for the people that are clearly dedicated to the lake we all enjoy. Without your support, the activities the lake association does for the improvement of lake for all of us that enjoy it, would not be possible. I wanted to personally say thank you. There are many people that have donated every year. I also wanted to provide some statistics about membership dues. I went back to 2017 to get my figures. Our newsletter will go out to approximately 555 individuals and businesses this year. Of those 555, here is the breakdown of induvial donors.

1. 28 individuals made up 50% of all the membership dues in collected in 2022.

2. 98 individuals made up the other 50% of the membership dues.

3. 429 people receiving this newsletter did not donate in 2022. I recognize some may have moved and we may have a handful of incorrect addresses.

4. 329 people have not donated in the last 2 years.

5. 274 (or approximately 50%) of the newsletter recipients have not donated in the last 5 years.

These stats aren't meant to shame anyone into donating money, they are just that, stats. The newsletters come from the GLA funds. As you know the board members and many others who help with music on the water, weed control, late winter garbage clean-up, carp control, etc. are volunteers. The more donations that are received, the more we can do for the lake.

Here is a breakdown of where we spend the money:

- 1. Evasive species weed control 68%
- 2. Music on the water 11%
- 3. Boat and trailer expenses for weed control etc. 10%
- 4. Printing and copying (Mostly the newsletter) 8%
- 5. Misc 3%
